# Two Major Assertions

- 1. We should take Lord's supper with (or as) common meal.
- 2. 'House churches'
  - a. leave larger congregations, meet in houses, ~three to four families
  - b. remain at large / larger congregations on Sunday morning, meet in 'house churches' Sunday night

# I. Short Review Of 'Proof'

# Bases entire premise on assumptions

- What may be may also not be
- "...there <u>seems</u> to be little question but that first-century Christians met together in small groups as <u>house churches</u>. Historically, of course, we know that it was not until the third century that Christians began to erect what we today would recognize as church buildings."
  - Jn.4:20-24, place does not matter
  - Ac.2 ... 19 ... 20 ... 1 Co.11

# Misuse of Scripture

- '...their <u>apparent</u> practice of worshiping together in private homes, <u>presumably</u> in <u>relatively small groups</u>. Ac.8:3. Of course, this <u>might</u> have taken place during the week in the homes of various disciples..."
  - Amazing. Ac.8:3 is not 'house churches' but individual Christians in homes
  - Ac.2:46 contrasts Temple worship with eating food in homes
  - 1 Co.14:23

# Misuse of Scripture

- Acts 20:20 "Paul might have been referring to times of private study with individual families in their own homes; or, equally possible, to his meetings with various house churches throughout Ephesus."
  - Assumes point he wants to prove.
  - NT does not authorize dividing a church into small churches [churches of a church]

- Jesus taught in private houses.
  - Also in a boat . . .
  - On a mountain . . .
  - In synagogues . . .
  - "Where" . . . is immaterial

- Spontaneity and 'each' (1 Co.14:26)
  - But 14:27, 29 limited
  - 1 Co.12:7, not spontaneous
  - 1 Co.14:40

- "When is there ever time set aside in our assemblies, not for 'scheduled' prayers, but for *prayer*? (That is, for prayers to be lifted up by whatever brother feels moved to do so.")
  - 1 Co.14:40

- "The primary difference between the first century and the twenty-first century is that apart from times when sermons were being preached there <u>seems</u> <u>not</u> to have been 'an <u>audience</u>' as we know it today. <u>When</u> <u>does a home ever have an audience</u>?"
  - Mk.2
  - Cf. Ac.20:7...20

- "Acts of worship' as practiced among us today – are mostly <u>an orchestrated reli-</u> gious spectacle for which we have <u>reserved</u> seats each week.")
  - Bald assertion; insulting; disrespectful
- "In effect, it's the clergy and the laity."
  - Inconsistent

### 1 Co.16:1-4 (1/2)

"there is simply no evidence that the early church ever made weekly contributions as part of an apostolically-mandated worship ritual. Their contributions, when made, were special collections intended to meet particular needs... If Paul's instructions about weekly contributions are to be regarded as a 'command' for us today, consistency demands that we hold our funds until Paul himself comes and delivers them to Jerusalem"

### 1 Co.16:1-4 (2/2)

- Position explains away entire NT
- Also explains away 'special collections' –
  Paul died.
  - Mk.14
  - Ac.8
  - 1 Co.16, pattern for raising funds (where is another?)
    - One example for its use (<u>benevolence</u>)
    - Other examples: evangelism (2 Co.11)

- "There was an intimacy that would have made standing up and singing an invitation song a complete nonsense"
  - Ac.5
  - Ac.8
  - Ga.2
  - Ja.5:16

#### Ro.16:3-5

Church meeting in house is bound by same teaching as all others:

WORK

AUTONOMY

OVERSIGHT

■ Ro.1:7 – 'saints in Rome'

Ro.16:3-5

Ro.16:14a

- May refer to another congregation in Rome
- Unlike Corinth, no place large enough for all Christians? (1 Co.14:23)

Ro.16:3-5

Ro.16:14a

Ro.16:15b

- Greets Christians . . . 'and all the saints who are with them'
  - House church advocates assume one church in Rome, composed of several house churches.
  - Ac.2, Temple church? Ac.19, School...? Ac.20, Upper room...?
  - Ro.16 gives example of more than one autonomous church in a city

# House Church plan makes number of churches within a church

- NT: elders (<u>plural</u>) oversee entire church (<u>singular</u>). Ac.20; 1 Pt.5
- 1 Co.11:17, church came together for L.S., ate common meals at home (22, 34).

Why not say, 'You have your own houses to eat **Lord's Supper** in'?

# In home setting, "hearts are opened"

- Ac.16:14
- Spirituality does not come from mere mechanics (spontaneous singing, chain prayers)
- Root of problem is internal and spiritual, not external and mechanical

# Substitutes feelings for edification

 An enthusiasm not based on gospel, but on feelings they get from being in a small group

'If pressed on the issue (which, so far, I've managed to side-step) I don't know that I'm prepared to say unequivocally that the house church was a divinely-intended arrangement. Not in the sense, at least, that it plainly violates God's will if we meet, instead, in purpose-built houses of worship ... However, I have no doubt but that moving away from the house-church concept has given rise to a system without scriptural support which has fundamentally changed the form and nature of worship as practiced in the apostolic church'

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
