The Church: Back To The Beginning

U.S.: 1700s - 1800s

- Many grew tired of divisions (sectarian fighting)
- Began to leave unscriptural traditions
- Renewed focus on Bible

What made the return to Bible difficult?

Ignorance

Most people in denominations do not know plan of salvation . . .

Tradition

Comfortable believing / practicing as they always have; dislike change

Party loyalty

Feel indebted to leaders; change only if they start 'meddling'

Acts 2:38, 40-41, 47 Acts 2 records the beginning

'The birthday of the church was Pentecost'

- God's part: revelation, Ac.2:1-36
- Man's part: response, Ac.2:37-47

Peter appeals to beginning to prove and to teach truth.

Apostasy

- Mt.7:15, false prophets existed; 'insured...'
- Mt.24:5, 24, even Josephus describes them
- Ac.20:28-31, foreign and domestic
- Ph.3:2, dogs
- Col.2:8, cheaters: carry off spoil, lead captive
- 2 Th.2:3, apostasy (7, 10)
- 1 Tim.4:1, some will leave truth, love lies

III. Reformation: Too Little, Too Late

Wyclif

- · "Morning-star of the reformation" urged return to Christianity of NT; set himself and his aides to translate the Bible as the sole and unerring guide to true religion. R. Cath. church, finding that heretics made much use of the Bible, had discouraged people from reading unauthorized translations. Wyclif was resolved that the Bible should be available to any Englishman who could read, and every reader be free to make his own interpretation of the Scriptural text (Durant, 36).
- Catholic reaction to translation: "The jewel of the clergy has become the toy of the laity."

Luther - theses

- Professors commonly nailed debate propositions and topics for discussion on doors of buildings.
- Luther wrote in Latin, wanting academic debate.
- Within 2 weeks his students printed them in German, sent them to every village.

Luther – Diet of Worms

- Eck asked Luther if he would recant his heresies. Luther agreed to retract any that should be proved contrary to Scripture.
- · Eck: "Martin, your plea to be heard from Scripture is the one always made by heretics. You do nothing but renew the errors of Wyclif and Huss ... How can you assume that **you** are the only one to understand the sense of Scripture?..."

Luther – Diet of Worms

· Luther: "...Unless I am convicted by the testimony of Sacred Scripture or by evident reason (I do not accept the authority of popes and councils, for they have contradicted each other), my conscience is captive to the Word of God. I cannot and I will not recant anything, for to go against my conscience is neither right nor safe. God help me. Amen" (Durant, 361).

Luther – Diet of Worms

Luther's profession contradicted his practice...

· "Though his theology was founded with trusting literalness on the Scriptures, his interpretation unconsciously retained late medieval traditions." ... "His rebellion was far more against Catholic organization and ritual than against Catholic doctrine; most of this remained with him to the (Durant, 371).

Some say it cannot be done.

'Patterns in the NT are not readily discernible. Which pattern in the NT do we follow? ...the pattern of incest in the church at Corinth? ...should we be divided like Corinthian Christians?'

- Paul <u>condemned</u> incest and division at Corinth (1 Co.3:1-3; 5:5).
- 1 Co.1:2, includes us (Jd.3) ... (4:6, 17).
- 1 Co.3, 5: ¹maintain unity; ²withdraw...

Restoration is common biblical concept

- Gn.40:13, 21, job
- 2 K.5:10, health
- Mt.17:11, spiritual
- Gal.6:1, individuals

Can <u>we</u> do what these brothers / churches did?

Mt.15:13-14

1 Jn.2:24

- 1 Co.4:21, congregatic 2 Co.12:20
 - Galatians / Corinthians read what Paul wrote.
 - Corinthians repented (2 Co.2, 7...).
 - They were restored / returned to NT plan.
