Summary

 No classical scholar doubts authenticity of Herodotus because earliest MSS are 1300+ years later than originals

To be skeptical of NT is to allow all of classical antiquity to slip into obscurity

Sir Frederick Kenyon

"The interval then between the dates of original composition and the earliest extant evidence becomes so small as to be in fact negligible, and the last foundation for any doubt that the Scriptures have come down to us substantially as they were written has now been removed. Both the authenticity and the general integrity of the books of the NT may be regarded as finally established"

 Benefit of doubt given to document itself, not arrogated by critic to himself

Lk.1¹ Inasmuch as many have taken in hand to set in order a narrative of those things which have been <u>fulfilled</u> among us, ² just as those who from the beginning were eyewitnesses and ministers of the word delivered them to us, ³ it seemed good to me also, having had perfect understanding of all things from the very first, to write to you an orderly account, most excellent Theophilus, ⁴ that you may know the certainty of those things in which you were instructed.
